Remember the days when you started to chase DX? There were two lists to see. One was the current list of countries (entities). The other was the list of ones you missed. It was the deleted list.

Wayne, N7NG, reminded me that when we first started watching this list in the '50s, there was a prefix that started with a <u>number</u>! That was 9S4, Saarland. It sounded exotic, to say the least. Where was this place? Where was Manchuria? Trieste?

Those were <u>deleted</u>, so I wasn't interested, just curious. Like most of you, I focused on those that still counted as new ones. We all tried to climb that ladder. The deleted list was of no real concern because it was <u>unreachable</u>.

I wondered how many of the areas I actually had worked, so I went through my QSLs to find out. What I found was most interesting! You may be surprised, too!

If you worked a German ham in Saarbrucken, you have worked the old 9S4. If you worked a BY in the "2" area, you worked the old Manchuria. You probably have worked Indonesian stations in all the old PK areas.


You quickly find that you have worked and confirmed most places on the deleted list, but there are a few that you probably have missed.

There are 21 deleted entities that I never worked before they were deleted, mostly because I was born too late, or because I was inactive between 1960 and 1968. Those 8 years produced many new ones that are now on the deleted list. Regardless of being deleted, those places still exist!

In the following few random examples, the top QSL is the deleted entity, and the bottom one is current for DXCC.

#### 8Z5 - Kuwait-Saudi Neutral Zone





The Kuwait-Saudi Neutral Zone was deleted in 1969. Near Qasi, El Khiran is now a Persian Gulf resort. 9K2UU has his retreat and primary station there.



#### 9S4 - Saarland

The Saar Protectorate existed between 1947 and 1956 as a French occupied territory.

Saarland is now a German state, located next to the French border in southwestern Germany.

Saarland is about 50 miles wide. Its largest city is Saarbrucken.

#### 9U5 - Ruanda-Urundi

This area of central Africa was a combination of Rwanda and Burundi that was managed by Belgium. Before July 1960 it was part of the Belgian Congo.



After 1962 independence Rwanda and Burundi became separate, shortly after the adjacent Belgian Congo became today's Democratic Republic of Congo



#### AC3 - Sikkim



This Himalayan kingdom was annexed by India in 1975. Its ruler, Prince Namgyl, was AC3PT. He was sporadically active on SSB.

In 1963 he married Hope Cooke from New York. After his exile he moved there, where he died in 1982. At least 9 VU stations currently exist in the Indian State of Sikkim.


#### AC4 - Tibet

Robert Ford was a British citizen working in Tibet during the late 1940s. As AC4RF, he made many QSOs on 20m. In 1950 he was captured and imprisoned by the Chinese for nearly 5 years. He eventually returned to England, where he died in September, 2013 at age 90. His book, Wind Between the Worlds, can be read online.

Tibet was assimilated into China in 1951 and was deleted in 1974. There are occasional Chinese expeditions into Tibet.


# C9 - Manchuria (Manchukuo)

Manchuria is the area north of the Korean peninsula, also called Manchukuo. It was controlled by Japan and used as a staging area for the invasion of China. The last activity was in 1951.



After WWII the area became northeast China, and was deleted in 1963. All Chinese call area 2 stations are in the former Manchuria.

## **CN2 - Tangier**

Tangier was founded in the 5<sup>th</sup> century BC by Carthaginians. It became part of Morocco and was deleted in 1960.

It is located at the western end of the Strait of Gibraltar, about 25 miles from Ceuta.

Tangier has long been associated with legendary spying and smuggling mysteries.

# **CR8 - Portuguese Timor**


Portuguese Timor became a part of Indonesia in 1975, deleted in 1976. East Timor then became independent in 2002 as Timor-Leste.

Capt. Bligh landed at the west end of Timor after a 4163 mile open boat voyage, following the mutiny of his ship, The Bounty.


#### CR8 - Goa

From 1510, Goa was a colony of Portugal on the west coast of India. Among Indian food lovers, it is well known for its cuisine. As the richest state in India, it still has some Portuguese street and city names. Many people in Goa have Portuguese names.









#### CR8 - Damao/Diu


Both the French and Portuguese had colonies in India for centuries. The Portuguese area was on the west coast, consisting of Goa and Daman/Diu.

There was only one operation of 55 contacts (on Diu Island) by W6ODD/CR8 in 1948. He was a merchant marine who also visited and operated from FI8. There has never been significant DX activity from Daman.

In 1961 W6CUQ noticed the distance from Goa to Diu Island seemed to be adequate for separate status for Diu (over 420 miles). Bob White at DXCC confirmed this. 13 years after the operation it became a separate country, deleted in the same year with Goa. There is no activity from Daman or Diu.

#### FI8 - French Indo-China

FI8 was deleted in 1950. A few 1952-1954 FI8 stations in Saigon counted as Vietnam.

The exiled Vietnamese emperor, Prince Vinh San, FR8VX, who was the first ham on Reunion I., was killed in a 1945 plane crash, leaving Ho Chi Minh as the main political force in Vietnam.

After 1950, Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia were on the banned list at different times. Laos was active from 1955. Cambodia was finally on in 1971 when XU1AA appeared.

After the Vietnam ban ended, the first operation was by Rundy, W3ZA/3W, in 1958.







#### FN8 - French India





The French colonies were along the East coast of India, except for Mahe, on the southwest coast. The only <u>legal</u> operation was by Deb Seal, FN8AD, just north of Calcutta in Chandernagore. Later he was VU2AX and AC4AX.

Many people in Pondicherry speak French as their usual language. Some streets and businesses have French names. There are no hams in the old French colonies that are active on the HF bands.






#### **I1 - Trieste**

Trieste is a port that had been a part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire. It ranked with Vienna, Budapest, and Prague as the most significant cities of that Empire, as its only seaport.

Located in the extreme north part of the Adriatic Sea, it has remained a part of Italy since 1957. A number of stations are active from Trieste, so check your stack of IV3 and IW3 QSLs.







#### JZ0 - Netherlands New Guinea

This western part of the island of New Guinea became Indonesian in 1969. Called Papua, its prefix is YB9.

SDDXC member K6DLV (SK) was active there for several years as YB0ARA/9. This area, the Papua Province (previously Irian Jaya) is the site of the Freeport-McMoRan copper mine where K6DLV worked.










#### 15 - Italian Somaliland

This entity, along with British Somaliland, became what is now Somalia. It was deleted in 1960. The main city was Mogadishu, where 10,000 Italians once lived, prior to WWII.

There was also a French Somaliland, which now exists as the same entity, renamed Djibouti after becoming independent in 1977.








**British and Italian Somaliland** 

### **VQ6 - British Somaliland**

British Somaliland also became part of Somalia in 1960 when it was deleted. Its capital was Hargeisa.

My VQ6LQ card is an example of generic QSLs used by SCDXC members. After being filled out, it was sent to the DX station for a signature and comments. Many confirmations were made this way in the 1950s and 1960s. It helped to confirm stations who did not QSL or had no cards.

In 1991 this area declared its independence from Somalia, but does not have international recognition.





#### VS4 - Sarawak

VS4 (Sarawak) and ZC5 (British North Borneo) were British colonies on the island of Borneo. Today they combine to form East Malaysia. Sarawak was deleted in 1963

It is known as the land of the Hornbills.

Nearby is V85 (formerly VS5), the Sultanate of Brunei (Brunei Darussalam). The rest of the island of Borneo is a part of Indonesia, YB7.






#### **ZC5 - British North Borneo**

British North Borneo became a part of East Malaysia along with Sarawak in 1963. Most of the island of Borneo is Indonesian, called Kalimantan (formerly PK5).

These early DXers knew the real secret to working the rare DX: Listen, listen, listen. Today the secret seems to be watch, watch, watch the DX clusters. "Someone else will surely find the DX, so all we have to do is click."

I hope these examples highlight how much more interesting DXing can be, especially when you're bored by chasing DX on new bands or are stalled trying to find new entities. This also explains my preference for paper QSLs.

Contacts to most deleted areas around the world are still available by working stations that are on the air today.
